Immediately behind Sir Walter comes his buffoon servant, with an absurd air of self-complacency, acknowledging in his ridiculous conceit the salutations intended for his master! A born low-comedian this!... Left to himself, Sir Walter returns to his seat and broods awhile over his pipe, declaiming some favourite lines by his friend Edmund Spenser. He has not heard the approach of his clownish servant, who has for some time been watching the blue smoke arise, with growing anxiety. The well-intentioned knave suddenly springs forward with a great black-jack of ale, which he empties over his mater with horrified cries of "Master's burning." Sir Walter leaps up with an oath, and drives the varlet off the stage; the latter, as he reaches the ruins is brought to the ground by a well-aimed shot with a drinking vessel from Sir Walter's hand.
